WELCOME AND SHALOM TO VISITORS

Grant us, Lord God, the knowledge of Your ways; direct our hearts to Your worship; forgive us so that we may be redeemed; keep us from suffering; satisfy us with the produce of the earth; and our dispersed gather from the four corners of the earth; and may the righteous rejoice at the building of Your house, the construction of Your Temple, the flourishing of the throne of David Your servant, and the lengthening of the light of Your Messiah, the son of Jesse. Before we call, answer us.


